## **EVENTS AND PROGRAMS**

**September 13<sup>th</sup>, Thursday, 7:30 PM Melville House, general meeting.** Robert Mayo, Director of the Folsom Library at RPI will speak on "Granville Hicks: The Man, His Books, and the Controversy." Hicks was a professor at RPI who was terminated in 1935 because of his unpopular socialist views. Granville Hicks later achieved fame both for his many literary reviews and also for his 1946 book, *Small Town*, written about the Town of Grafton he called home for many years. The meeting is open to the public and refreshments will be served.

**September 15<sup>th</sup>, Saturday, 11:00 AM meet at the Melville House.** In conjunction with the 2012 Hudson River Valley Ramble, LHS Trustee Russell Ziemba will lead a hiking and driving tour of six urban and rural locations where one can view the Hudson River, from south of Lansingburgh to the clay banks on the east side of Champlain Lock I in Schaghticoke. Program should be concluded by 1:30 PM. The tour is open to the public and beverages will be available.

October 11<sup>th</sup>, Thursday, 7:30 PM Melville House general meeting. Ernie Mann, will speak about the Railroads of Rensselaer. His book on this subject was issued by Arcadia Publishing in 2009. Rensselaer was once a classic American railroad town, and like most cities and of its type, it was part of an important junction of several destinations. From the 1840s to today, trains have rolled to the four principal compass points from downtown. Ernie Mann has had a lifelong interest in rail history and worked his way through college in locomotive service. He had a long career as a teacher and many years as a city fire chief. The meeting is open to the public and refreshments will be served.

October 18, Thursday, 5:30 PM Veterans of Lansingburgh Hall, 771 First Ave.- our annual GALA FUND RAISER DINER AND SILENT AUCTION. This is the biggest fund raising event of the year for our historical society. Even better, it's an evening of great food., an auction with something for everyone, and an ideal time to reacquaint with friends and meet folks you haven't seen recently. October 31<sup>st</sup> Halloween, Wednesday, 6:30 PM, meet at Melville House LHS will present their inaugural lectures and tour of haunted Lansingburgh. The program will begin with brief presentations, along with some Q & A time, on the science of "ghost hunting" from Gary Robusto of the Tri-City NY Paranormal Society, and how to conduct historical research on how to document your neighborhood ghosts, by LHS Archivist, Warren F. Broderick. Then we will tour 5 haunted sites in central Lansingburgh by foot, involving about one mile of walking. At each site possible explanations of the spirit presences will be given, and we will conclude by attending a Halloween party at a lovely historical home that is truly haunted. There will be a \$20 per person participation fee, with proceeds being used to restore a gravesite in historic Trinity churchyard. No persons under 12 years of age may attend. Reservations are required as the tour attendees will be limited to no more than 30 persons.

November 15<sup>th</sup>, Thursday, 7:00 PM, Melville House our annual holiday party and auction will be held. We will auction a number of items that are suitable for holiday gift giving: small antiques, collectibles, Christmas books and holiday ornaments. # **Emilie C. Adams (1853-1935)**

Emilie C. Adams was born in Troy in 1853; her parents were Warren L. Adams, a prominent merchant, and Pamelia Hamblin. She was a graduate of Troy High School and her parents' income, in spite of her father's death when she was young, afforded her art training in Brooklyn and New York City and later in Paris, France and Dresden Germany. She also perfected the art of china painting at France's famous Sevres factory.

Back home in Lansingburgh she established her own studio at 745 Third Avenue in 1894. Two years later she co-founded the Emma Willard School of Art in the Plumb Memorial building on Second Street. The school was open to the public of both genders, not merely students of the Troy Female Seminary. She engaged both talented local women and accomplished artists as her instructors. The school's staff always included one prominent artist who served as "critic" and who visited Troy at regular intervals to meet with students and critique their work. Noted American Impressionist painter, John Henry Twachtman, served as critic from 1896 until his death in 1901.

Emilie Adams was known be outspoken and highly opinionated, likely leading to her parting ways suddenly with Troy Female Seminary leadership in 1907. The Emma Willard art school lasted only two additional years, and along with some of her instructors, Emilie then founded her Troy School of Arts and Crafts in the Green building at 405 Broadway in Troy. Various fine and decorative arts popular during that era were taught at both schools under her direction, including "mineral painting" (on china, porcelain and metal), anatomical drawing, glass decorating, ornamental cut leather work, tapestry weaving and painting, "pyrography" (decorative wood burning) and ornamental metallurgy.

Emilie Adams exhibited infrequently and primarily water colors: "Sketch of an Old Cavalier" at the Brooklyn Art Association in 1882 and in 1904 a series of similar works ("Alpine Hunter," "Dutch Housewife," etc.) at the Rensselaer Hotel in Troy. The Lansingburgh Historical Society owns a portrait of an old man with a pipe and three beautifully executed floral water color still lifes, as well an oil of the White Mountains very reminiscent of the work of William R. Tyler, one of her favorite colleagues. She also excelled at finely detailed painting on china

She maintained her own studio in Lansingburgh after her school closed in 1918 until her death on April 4, 1935 in Pleasantdale. As most of her work was unsigned it is likely to assume that other works of hers may be found in the collections of Troy and Lansingburgh families. She is interred in Section B, lot 48 in Oakwood Cemetery.
